### HC 0401: 9-1-1 fee increase amendment

#### Request to Legislators:

Ask your legislator to add HC 0401 to their amendment list. It is vital that we have multiple legislators submit this exact amendment before the amendment deadline of March 14th.

#### Amendment Summary:

The previous budget (HB 33) increased the statewide user fee from 25 cents to 40 cents and expanded to other devices that can contact 9-1-1 such as VoIP channels. The fee increase was expected to bring in around \$100 million a year and is currently bringing in \$50 million a year. The amendment would cover that \$50 million shortfall and provide counties with additional funding to cover future technology upgrades for 9-1-1.

#### **Talking Points:**

- If you are a pilot county or currently operating an NG 9-1-1 system highlight the impact of the system on your community.
  - Examples may include:
    - Decrease in the number of call transfers;
    - Ability to consolidate PSAP's; and
    - Real examples of the lifesaving technology provided by NG 91-1.
- If you are not a pilot county or currently operating a NG 9-1-1 system, the NG 9-1-1 system offers many benefits, including:
  - Allows for precise geolocating for dispatchers to increase response time for first responders;
  - Allows citizens to text to 9-1-1 or send videos to privately contact 9-1-1 if they are in a vulnerable situation:
  - Allow dispatchers to transfer information collected when the caller crosses county lines; and
  - Virtually eliminates the possibility that a 9-1-1 call will be disconnected or "dropped."
- The previous operating budget increased the monthly user fee from 25 cents per month to 40 cents per month and expanded that fee to apply to wireless devices, VoIP channels, and Multi-telephone Systems (MTS).
- The revenue from that fee was expected to bring in around \$100 million dollars a year to

the state and counties. The fee is currently bringing in around \$50 million.

• The system is going to go live statewide during 2025 and counties need financial support to upgrade and operate this system at the local level.
